Eight day extravaganza to celebrate the best of the East

Asia Week is bringing the best of China, Japan, Korea, India, the Himalayas, and Southeast Asia to Manhattan. Starting March 16, numerous New York galleries and auction houses will feature ancient, antique, and contemporary Asian artworks.

A not-to-be-missed event for serious collectors and casual viewers, 33 galleries will house the finest examples of art from the East from local and international dealers. Porcelain, jewelry, paintings, prints, sculptures and glowing, shiny jades are just a sampling of the objects on view;

Some must-sees include pottery figures from the Tang Dynasty at Joe-Hynn Yang, Courage & Joy, Inc.; Dalton SomarÉ's exhibition of "Images from the Hindu and Buddhist Pantheon," at Pace Gallery; and "Approaching the Horizon: Important Japanese Prints from the Collection of Brewster Hanson," at Joan B. Mirviss Ltd., which includes works by Katsushika Hokusai, Hiroshige, Eisen, and Yoshitoshi.
